

in fac simile on page 201 of the Year Book, Sons of the American Revolution, New York State Society, 1893-94, is dated May 19, 1775, and signed by Joseph Warren, President, P. T., and Samuel Freeman, Secretary, P. T., of "The Congress of the Colony of the Massachusetts Bay." At the close of the Revolutionary War he was a colonel. His tombstone bears the inscription, "He was an officer of the Revolution at the siege of Quebec in 1775, under Gen. Montgomery." He was one of the commissioners to buy the "Boston Purchase" or "Boston Ten Townships," containing about 230,000 acres and constituting a large portion of Broome and Tioga Counties in New York State. He owned and managed about 3,000 acres of the above named purchase just west of Owego, being named as one of the first settlers of Owego in 1790.
