Charles R. Day was a lawyer in Newark, N. J., and a descendant of George D. Day who went from Branford, Ct., and was one of the first settlers of Newark. Also a descendant of Stephen Day, the first printer in America. Judge Stephen Delevan Day, father of Charles R. Day, was one of the founders of Orange, N. J., the first and most successful merchant there.

W. C. Bracken secured his academic training at Jefferson College, Cannonsburgh, Pa. He commenced the study of medicine under Dr. Herriott at Cannonsburgh and completed his medical education at Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia. He began the practice of medicine at Tridelfhia, Va., in 1848. In 1849 he removed to Noblestown, Pa., where he practised until 1856. In 1857 he settled in Jersey, O., where he continued to practice until his death.

He was a member and active worker in the Presbyterian Church. He was spoken of as "faithful, sympathetic, able and skilful,
