

And if it shall not appear from the said certificates that there are contraband goods on board, the ships shall be permitted to proceed on their voyage. If it shall appear from the certificates, that there are contraband goods on board, any such vessel or commander of the same shall offer to deliver them up, the offer shall be accepted, and the ship shall be at liberty to pursue its voyage, unless the quantity of the contraband goods be greater than can conveniently be received on board the ship of war or privateer, in which case the ship may be carried into port for the delivery of the same.

Any ship shall not be furnished with such papers or certificates as are above required for a privateer, such a fact may be examined by a proper judge or tribunal, and if it shall appear from other documents or proofs, satisfactorily by the officers of nations, that such ship belongs to the citizens of the neutral party, it shall not be confiscated, but shall be released with her cargo (contraband goods excepted) and be permitted to proceed on her voyage.

ARTICLE XVIII.
If the ships of the citizens of either of the parties shall be met with, either falling along the coast, or on the high seas, by any ship of war or privateer, the officers for the avoiding of any disorder, the said ships of war or privateers shall remain out of cannon boat, and may fend their boats on board the merchant ship which they shall meet with, and may enter the same, the number of two or three men only, to whom the master or commander of such ship shall exhibit his papers concerning the property of the ship, made out according to the form prescribed in the fourth article of the present treaty, and that the neutral party shall in no case be required to go on board the examining vessel for the purpose of exhibiting his papers, or for any other examination whatever.

ARTICLE XIX.
It is expressly agreed by the contracting parties, that the stipulations above mentioned, relative to the conduct to be observed on the sea by the cruisers of the belligerent party towards the ships of the neutral party, shall be applied only to ships falling within convoy; and when the said ships shall be convoyed, it being the intention of the parties to observe all the regard due to the neutrality of the sea displayed by public ships, it shall not be lawful to visit them; but the verbal declaration of the commander of the vessel, that the ships he conveys belong to the nation whose flag he carries, and that there are no contraband goods on board, shall be considered by the respective cruisers as fully sufficient; the two parties expressly engaging not to admit under the protection of their convoys, ships which shall carry contraband goods destined to an enemy.

ARTICLE XX.
In all cases where vessels shall be captured or detained under pretence of carrying to the enemy contraband goods, the captor shall receive a receipt for such of the contents of the vessel as he shall retain, which receipt shall be annexed to a descriptive list of the said papers: and it shall be unlawful to break up or open the hatches, chests, trunks, casks, barrels, or vessels found on board, or remove the smallest part of the goods, unless the lading be brought on shore in presence of the competent officers, and an inventory be made by them of the said goods. Nor shall it be lawful to sell, give or alienate the same, or any part thereof, unless there have been lawful process, and the competent judge or judges shall have pronounced against such goods the sentence of confiscation, having allowed the ship and the others on which it contains.

ARTICLE XXI.
And that proper care may be taken of the lading and cargo, and embalmment prevented, it is agreed, that it shall not be lawful to remove the matters, commander or percentage of a captured ship from the board thereof, either during the time the ship may be at sea after her capture, or pending the proceedings against her or her cargo, or any thing relative thereto. And in all cases where a vessel of the citizens of either party shall be captured, or seized, and held for adjudication, her officers, passengers and crew shall be hospitably treated. They shall not be imprisoned or deprived of any part of their wearing apparel, nor of their arms and accoutrements, nor of the exceeding for the captain, supercargo, and mate five hundred dollars each, and for the sailors and passengers, one hundred dollars each.

ARTICLE XXII.
It is further agreed, that in all cases,

the establishment of prize courts, in the country to which the prizes may be condemned, shall always take cognizance of the same. And whenever such tribunal officer of the parties shall pronounce judgment in favour of either party, the prizes claimed by the citizens of the other party, the sentence or decree shall mention the reasons or motives on which the same shall have been founded, and an authentic copy of the sentence or decree, and of all the proceedings in the case, shall if demanded, be delivered to the commander or agent of the said vessel, without any delay, he paying the legal fees for the same.

ARTICLE XXIII.
And that more abundant care may be taken for the security of the respective citizens of the contracting parties, and to prevent their suffering injuries by the men of war or privateers of either party, all commanders of ships of war and privateers, and all others the said citizens, shall forbear doing any damage to those of the other party, or committing any outrage against the persons of the latter, and of which they shall be punished, and shall also be bound in their persons and estates to make satisfaction and reparation for all damages and the interest thereof, of whatever nature, the said damages may be.

For this cause all commanders of privateers before they receive their commissions, shall hereafter be obliged to give, before a competent judge, full security by at least two responsible persons, who have no interest in the said privateers, each of whom together with the said commander, shall be jointly and severally bound in the sum of seven thousand dollars or thirty six thousand eight hundred and twenty francs, or such other sum as may be agreed upon, and if any of them shall die, or be incapacitated, or any of them may die or commit during their exile, contrary to the terms of this convention, or to the laws and instructions for regulating their conduct, a surety, that in the event of aggressions, the said commission shall be revised and annulled.

ARTICLE XXIV.
When the ships of war of the two contracting parties, or of those belonging to their citizens, which are armed, shall be admitted to enter within their prizes the ports of either of the two parties, as the said public or private ships, as well as their prizes, shall not be obliged to pay any duty either to the officers of the place, the judges or any other in or out of such prizes, when they come to and enter the ports of either party, be arrested or seized, nor shall the officers of the place make exacting duties, or demands, or take any such prizes; but they may hold full at any time and depart and carry their prizes to the places expressed in their commissions, which the commanders of such ships of war are not to oppose. It is always understood that the stipulations of this article shall not extend beyond the privileges of the most favored nation.

ARTICLE XXV.
It shall not be lawful for any foreign privateers who have commissions from any prince or state in enmity with either nation, to sell their ships in the ports of either nation, to sell their prizes, or in any manner to exchange them; neither shall they be allowed to purchase provisions, except such as shall be necessary for their going to the next ports of their prize or state, from which they have received their commissions.

ARTICLE XXVI.
It is further agreed, that both the said contracting parties shall not only refuse to receive any prizes into any of their ports, havens or towns, or permit any of their vessels to be employed in their favor, conceal or assist them in any manner, but will bring to condign punishment all fish inhabitants as well be guilty of such acts or offences.

ARTICLE XXVII.
Neither party will intermeddle in the fisheries of the other on its coasts nor disturb the others in the exercise of the rights which it now holds or may acquire on the coast of Newfoundland in the

Gulf of St. Lawrence, or elsewhere on the American coast, northward of the United States. But the whole and fisheries shall be free to both in every quarter of the world.

This convention shall be ratified of both sides in due form, and the ratifications exchanged in the space of six months or sooner if possible.

In faith whereof the respective plenipotentiaries have signed the above articles both in the French and English languages, and they have thereto affixed their seals; declaring nevertheless that they signifying in the two languages shall not be obligatory in any part, but only operating to the prejudice of either party.

Done at Paris the eighth day of Vendémiaire of the nineteenth year of the French Republic, the third day of September anno Domini eighteen hundred and one.

We understand that in the progress of the negotiations attending the French Treaty, in case that treaty was not ratified, the claims of the American government for indemnities made under that treaty, ought not to be allowed. Our commissioners, in conformity to instructions received from the government of the United States, to be altogether inadmissible; but we have favoured for a considerable length of time to obtain compensation for illegal seizures, without connecting therewith the condition insisted upon by the French commission, if they however failed in the accomplishment of this object, and finally submitted the consideration of indemnities to future negotiation.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

FRIDAY, December 19, 1800.
MR. CLAYTON has laid before the House memorial of the House of Representatives of the Middlebury Territory, stating some inconveniences which had arisen from a want of authority in the governor, to issue writs of election, in case of improper returns; and also the want of jurisdiction on the part of Governor Sargent, to have the General Assembly organized, and stating the advantage which would accrue to the territory, if an earlier day for the meeting of the legislature was fixed by a law of Congress.

On motion,
The said memorial was referred to Mr. Calhoun, Mr. Goodrich, and Mr. North, with authority to report by Bill or otherwise.

MR. DAVIS moved the reference to the same committee of certain resolutions submitted by him to the house during the last session, but then not acted upon, stating the alleged existence of several unconstitutional laws in the Middlebury Territory, whereby unjust and extortionate were practiced on the citizens.

The resolutions were read: after the reading, MR. GRISWOLD, in support of the motion for a reference till Monday, which was agreed to.
MR. GRISWOLD, from the committee to whom was referred so much of the President's Speech as related to the Judiciary of the United States, having been heard, read twice, was referred to a committee of the whole house on Monday.

MR. H. LEE from the committee to whom was referred the several propositions made by the President, and preferred the Memorial of George Washington, reported a bill for the erection of a Mausoleum, differing in no other respects from the former bill referred, except as to the materials of which the same proposed to be made of stone, the former bill directing it to be made of marble, one other directing it to be made of marble.

He said that the committee, after maturely considering the relative merits of all the plans proposed, had preferred the Mausoleum, as well from its superior durability as cheapness to any other.

The bill was read twice, and referred to a committee of the whole house on Tuesday.
The Committee on unfinished business re-

ported in part a bill of certain laws relative to revenue which expired with the present session, and recommended to refer the expediency of continuing them to the committee on Ways and Means.

The report, being read twice, was agreed to.
