Charlotte Hall School. On the 25th of October 1823, the Trustees proceeded to the election of the Principal of said school for the year 1823, when the Rev. GEORGE RALPH was unanimously elected.

The Trustees of Charlotte Hall School will meet at the Cool Springs, on Monday the 13th of December next for the purpose of appointing a vice Principal, and an Assistant Teacher of the Languages. The salary of the vice Principal will be two hundred and fifty pounds per annum, provided he is capable of teaching the French as well as the Latin and Greek Languages; if incapable of teaching the French Language, his salary will be two hundred pounds.
