On Monday last, the 10th inst. the British packet was seized by the British frigate at the water's edge, going out, for (as it said) having specie on board for exportation, 200,000 dollars, and the superintendent embargo laws. The packet is now in arrest.

As accounts are published in the press, it is somewhat different from the story I deem it proper to say that my information is from the British consul at New York. We have forbore mentioning any thing relative to the detention of the vessel, as the result is a very contradictory report concerning it. 23rd inst. rec'd.—On the 25th arrived his majesty's ship *Eurydice*. She left Plymouth, England, on the 21st, and arrived at this port on the 24th—of Lisbon on the 5th and on the morning of the 1st instant she was ordered to be taken into port. The intelligence which she brought is very important.

REPORTS IN PORTUGAL.—SIR ARTHUR AYTON.

On the 15th of August, near Malta, there was a partial action between the British army, under the command of Sir Arthur Wellesley, and the French under Gen. Junot, in which the former was victorious, and two thousand officers, one of whom it was said was Col. Lake of the 93rd Regiment, were taken into captivity, and suffered severely. On the 21st a general action took place; Junot's army was completely defeated, and he was obliged to retreat, and was killed, wounded and prisoners; our loss was 800. On the night of the 21st the French evacuated the position of Lisbon with the honors of war, and returned to France in British transports, many were assembling in the fugitive. The French, while the operations of the convention were in discussion, requested that the British should be permitted to return home, which was refused, and their surrender to the British army was demanded in the present moment. Junot's army, at the time of its surrender, amounted to 16,000 men.

On the 21st, under the command of Sir Harry Burrard were landing at Peniche during the action of the 26th.

Joseph Donaparte is said to have taken a strong position at Burgos; he has since fled from Madrid with 600 men.

[By order of the Government.] The following official dispatches have been received by Express: Headquarters at Annapolis, at six o'clock in the evening, July 19.

Mokey, Secretary of War, &c. At All post five o'clock in the evening, with a flag of truce, requesting that orders should be issued to the La Peno to suspend hostilities, which general Dupont should hold a conference with the general, &c. replied in the negative. A few moments since, I received a letter from general Duport himself, informing me that he had concluded to suspend hostilities. I grant them no other terms than that they shall be prisoners of war, with permission to the general and officers to wear their swords, and to take with them a portmanteau each, fitted with their clothes only, in consequence of the pillage which they have committed in our towns; avenging, however, of the same time, they shall be treated with the same respect as those belonging to the religion of the same faith, and in whatever way the Spanish general wishes. The details are preparing, I beg leave to acquaint your highness, that we have taken some cannon from the French, and, in short, that general Duport is completely hemmed in on all sides.
