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—Try this Recipe

Take a large saucepan with five cups boiling water, add a little salt; test part of it, remove so boiling violently, and so on until it is slowly cooking. Cook about 20 minutes uncovered, without stirring. Then take out a few grains; if they are soft, the rice is cooked. Drain in colander, season back of a towel until thoroughly dry so grains will fall apart. Serve with cream and sugar for breakfast. Serve as vegetable, with butter or gravy, for dinner.


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
