

WHAT U. S. TROOPS MAY ENCOUNTER IN PURSUING VILLA.

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A Problem in Preparedness: If it requires 5,000 regulars to capture 500 Mexican bandits, how many regulars, militiamen and volunteers would be required to capture a trained European army of 200,000 men?


Problems in Preparedness: If the capture of 500 Mexican bandits and the guarding of the United States-Mexican border require all of the regular continental army of the United States except eight regiments, how many regiments would be required to defend the Atlantic and Pacific coasts from two trained European armies, each mustering 200,000 seasoned soldiers?

If the United States needs all but eight regiments of its army to catch Villa and guard its Mexican border, what would it do in case of war with a united Mexico?

Answer — Call on the militia and for volunteers.

How long would it require for city bred guardsmen and volunteers to get hardened and trained to efficiency for the kind of warfare and hardships they would encounter in the deserts and rocky wastes of Mexico?

And what price in sickness and death would be paid for unpreparedness?

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A Problem in Preparedness: If it takes the United States four days to assemble and equip a force of 5,000 men for chasing 500 Mexican bandits, all the troops being within a small radius, how long would it take to mobilize, equip and transport an army sufficient to defend a Pacific or Atlantic coast city from an army of 200,000 trained European soldiers?
